Goals for Nutrition Promotion:

PROGRESS UPDATE: The region needs to ensure that all new and remodeled locations have updated materials in place. The high school is a leading example with breakfast promotions and giveaways. The elementary schools need to incorporate more activities. Principals are continuing to encourage healthy eating especially at the beginning of the day when students arrive with unhealthy food. Students continue to provide input into the menu. Nutritional standards are posted on the website with our menus. Information is sent home to families to encourage healthy eating. We have seen that meals brought from home vary greatly in healthiness. We need to continue all of these goals to continue to encourage families to find healthy options.

Goals for Nutrition Education

PROGRESS UPDATE: School presentations are happening, but we still need to build student investment. Guidelines and nutritional information is posted. We need to continue these goals and build investment of students in nutrition.

Goals for Physical Activity

PROGRESS UPDATE: Our teachers are PA Certified teachers. We have continued to invest in new equipment for each school. The new gym space at middle school is a big addition to increasing physical activity at the middle school. The new Bolts league also at the middle school had increased the number and diversity of students participating in physical activities. We need to continue these goals to continue to improve/increase the physical activity of our students.

PROGRESS UPDATE: We have established a wellness committee and disseminated the information from the programs. We did not have a wellness week at all schools are need to ensure this happens across all campuses next year. The Jump Rope for Heart program at KWPEA is a leading example of promoting physical health and fund-raising. We need to continue these goals.
